First Aid Kits

- The components of a first aid kit should include the basic supplies to treat common injuries that occur on the job. When composing a first aid kit, consider the types of machinery, materials and hazards the workers are exposed to and keep in mind the injuries that could result.
- A basic first aid kit should include supplies for the following injuries:
 - Burns hydrogel dressings, burn spray, ointments, cold packs
 - <u>Cuts</u> gauze, tape, bandages, antiseptic items, cut cleaners, antibiotic ointment
 - Eye injuries eye washes, neutralizers
 - Shock or fainting ammonia inhalants
 - <u>Fractures</u> splints, triangular bandages
 - Contusions cold packs, bandages
 - Bee stings sting extractors, pain relief products
 - Splinters splinter forceps
 - <u>Contagion control</u> gloves, one-way valve mask, antibacterial surface cleaners, skin cleaner
 - General wellness non-prescription cold medicine, head and stomach ache remedies
- You should also add items to your first aid kit that are particular to your workplace.
- If there are items missing from the first aid kit at your work place, make sure to tell a supervisor so that the items can be replaced.

Instructor Tips

- Ask workers if they have experienced an emergency and discuss their impressions.
- Review your own company emergency action plan.
- Discuss several ways first responders can become victims.
- Point out locations of phones, fire extinguishers and first aid kits.
